HISTORY OF THE NAMES

Bethine's Burrata: Jean Bethine Clark Church, (February 19, 1923 – December 21, 2013), was the spouse of U.S. Senator Frank Church of Idaho. As politically active as her husband, she earned the nickname of "Idaho's third senator." In many ways Bethine Clark was as politically active as her husband, actively participating in his campaigns for the Senate and his 1976 Presidential campaign.

Borah Brussel Sprouts: William Edgar Borah, (June 29, 1865 – January 19, 1940) was a Republican United States Senator, one of the best-known figures in Idaho's history. A progressive who served from 1907 until his death in 1940, Borah is often considered an isolationist,[a] for he led the Irreconcilables, senators who would not accept the Treaty of Versailles, Senate ratification of which would have made the U.S. part of the League of Nations.

C. Ben Ross Caesar: Charles Benjamin Ross, (December 27, 1876 – March 31, 1946) was the first Idaho-born Governor of Idaho and an important Idaho political figure throughout the 1930s. Ross served as governor from 1931 until 1937.

Chenoweth's Chicken: Helen Palmer Chenoweth-Hage, born Helen Margaret Palmer, (January 27, 1938 – October 2, 2006) was the only Republican woman to ever represent the State of Idaho in the United States Congress.

Old Fort Boise Burger: Old Fort Boise, (1834) Thomas McKay, an associate of the Hudson Bay Company, built a fort on the east bank of the Snake River. Old Fort Boise, was located at the mouth of the Boise River, 40 miles from present day Boise. In 1854, due to frequent Indian raids, the fort was abandoned. Despite this, the military desired to build another fort in the area, but, before this plan could go into effect, gold was discovered in the Boise Basin in 1862. On July 4th, 1863, the military chose a location for the new Fort Boise. Parma, Idaho was located next to the fort, and with the protection of the military, the town grew quickly. A major reason for this growth, other than the gold rush, was its location along the Oregon Trail. Parma's Old Fort Boise on the Eastern edge of town has a replica of Fort Boise, a museum and an authentic pioneer cabin.

Pete's Lamb Chops: Pete Thomas Cenarrusa, (December 16, 1917 – September 29, 2013) was an Idaho Republican politician. He served continuously for over half a century in elective office, first as a member of the Idaho Legislature & then as Secretary of State. His Basque heritage was an essential part of his life.

Pfost Pork: Gracie Bowers Pfost (March 12, 1906 – August 11, 1965) was the first woman to represent Idaho in the United States Congress, serving five terms as a Democrat in the House of Representatives. Pfost represented the state's 1st district from 1953 to 1963. The "Hell's Belle" of Congress, she was a moderately liberal Democrat, who earned her nickname in her first year, fighting for a large federal dam on the Snake River in Hells Canyon.

Steunenberg Salmon: Frank Steunenberg, (August 8, 1861 – December 30, 1905) was the fourth Governor of the State of Idaho, serving from 1897 until 1901. In 1905 he was assassinated in Caldwell, Idaho.

Sweet's Summer Salad: Willis Sweet (January 1, 1856 – July 9, 1925) was the first United States Representative elected from Idaho following statehood in 1890. Sweet served as a Republican in the House from 1890 to 1895, representing the state at-large.

W. Wallace French Onion: William Henson Wallace (February 1, 1864 - March 3, 1865)

(July 19, 1811 – February 7, 1879) was an important figure in the early histories of two U.S. states, serving as governor and Congressional delegate from both Washington Territory and Idaho Territory.
